Our school



Westmorland is a co-educational, independent, specialist day school in Chorley, Lancashire. We provide education for children between the ages of 5-11 for children with a range of additional needs including Social, Emotional and Mental Health needs (SEMH); Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN) and Autism. Our class sizes are small and there is a high staff ratio; typically classes have a maximum of 8 children and a minimum of 2 staff members.


All of our pupils have access to a range of therapy sessions and one of these is speech and language. There is a full time speech and language therapist based in school. Throughout the 2017/2018 academic year, Elklan 5-11 training was delivered to staff members as part of a plan to develop a whole school approach to supporting SLCN.



The focus of Elklan is to provide support within the classroom on a daily basis by embedding Elklan support strategies to maximise the outcomes of our pupils and encourage development through consistent support for SLCN.

Elklan offers staff the opportunity to gain a nationally recognised accredited qualification. It is recognised on The Communication Trusts "What Works?" website as an effective training course for supporting SLCN.

Staff rating of ability to identify SLCN






